Qalipu Announces Socio-Economic Agreement

October 8th, 2014

The Qalipu Mi'kmaq First Nation Band is pleased to announce the finalization of a Socio-Economic Agreement for the Maritime Link Project. This agreement builds on the positive relationship that has developed with Emera Newfoundland and Labrador over the past two years.

The agreement includes provisions to follow through on commitments made during the federal Environmental Assessment process to consider current use of land and resources for traditional purposes, and to monitor potential interactions. It will also promote training, employment and business opportunities for Qalipu members.

Qalipu and Marine Contractors Building for the Future

Marine Contractors Inc. and the Qalipu Mi'kmaq First Nation have recently teamed up to form **MCI Qalipu**, a new joint venture company that will be engaged in civil construction work. The new company will target major project development contracts in Newfoundland and Labrador.

MCI Qalipu has set its focus on the immediate opportunities surrounding the Muskrat Falls and Maritime Link Projects. The company also hopes to capitalize on subcontracting opportunities with other tier one companies.



MCI Qalipu Finds Early Success in Partnership With Major Award

MCI Qalipu, has been awarded the Site Preparation contract for the Maritime Link Project in western Newfoundland.

The new company will perform much of the civil construction work for the Maritime Link Project, to prepare for the construction of the converter station and switchyards. Most of the construction will take place in Central and Southwestern Newfoundland. The site preparation work, which has already started, is scheduled to be completed by January, 2016 and will employ up to 100 workers.

Women's Equine Retreat

October 4th, 2014

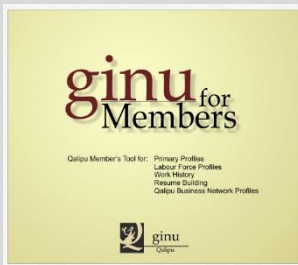

Skills Parachute Program and Short-Term Course Funding

The Skills Parachute Program is designed to increase the skills of the client by improving their chances of maintaining or gaining employment. This program provides funding for short-term courses up to a maximum of 5 days in length and at a maximum cost of \$1000.

The Short-term Courses program is longer than 5 days, but less than 12 weeks in duration. Applicants can apply for funding through the Short-Term Course Funding Program.

Qalipu Natural Resources Update

As the colorful leaves fall to the ground, many of us are busy storing wild foods for our winter diets. For Mi'kmaq in the region, one important wild food has been the American eel, traditionally speared through the ice in the winter. The American eel remains important to many Qalipu members today for cultural reasons including medicinal purposes. The Natural Resources Division has been studying the American eel for a number of years, focusing on the collection of traditional knowledge on harvesting methods, monitoring juvenile eels entering freshwater systems, and monitoring the commercial eel harvest to document eel population health.

During 2014-2015, The Natural Resources Division monitored juvenile eel entry into the Harry's River system and the fall commercial eel harvest in both Western and Central Newfoundland. The division

is also excited to mark the first year of a strong working relationship with Parks Canada. Qalipu staff worked closely with Gros Morne National Park to deliver an educational program for park visitors to educate the public on the biology and cultural significance of the American eel as they checked eel traps, and were permitted to measure and weigh any eels captured.

Natural Resources staff are currently completing funding requests to further these American eel studies into 2015-2016, and look forward to continued involvement with the species to preserve this valuable resource for generations to come.
